Route Map to Free Public Transport

- 1. Re-regulate all the buses using new 'franchising' powers plan the network properly to reach isolated communities and to integrate seamlessly with other transport modes (trains and Subway). Impose an immediate cap on fares.
- 2. Set-up a new publicly-owned bus company for Greater Glasgow and start taking over routes one-by-one, or buy-out First Glasgow.
- 3. Once costs have been brought under control, we can begin to roll out free fares for all (we currently give more than £300 million in public subsidies to private bus companies annually).

"REGISTERED attendees and volunteers" at the COP26 climate summit are to have a free travel smartcard enabling access to Glasgow's buses, trains and Subway system. But if facilitating travel for visiting dignitaries is so easy, why has Scotland's largest city still failed to introduce an Oyster-style card for the plebs? The Get Glasgow Moving campaign has been lobbying on this issue for five years, but to no avail.

Most Glaswegians who use more than one means of transport buy separate tickets for each. Different private bus companies have tickets that are not interchangeable, plus individual apps, while the publicly owned Subway – aka the Clockwork Orange - and ScotRail have separate smartcards.

When asked about Glasgow's failure to keep up with the 21st century, the Strathclyde Partnership for Transport passed the buck to Holyrood's Transport Scotland, who said there was already integrated ticketing through SPT's paper "Zonecard". Transport Scotland's press officer failed to mention that the Zonecard is a season ticket costing between £20.90 to £75.70 (depending how many zones it covers) for a week's travel - not much good if you work from home for a day a week or more.

Transport Scotland – an agency of the SNP government which is making hay out of plans to renationalise ScotRail - said that although it supports integrated fares, "adopting a universal smart ticketing scheme is ultimately a commercial matter for transport operators". The spokeswoman added: "The technology does exist for passengers to use one smartcard to travel on bus, rail, tram and subway, and has done since November 2019." All very well, but what's the use of having the technology if the people in charge will only issue these travelcards to the global elite?

GOOD COP, BAD COP?

SMART ARSES

THERE was uproar in Glasgow after Eye 1558 revealed that COP26 delegates would receive smart cards allowing seamless - and free - travel on buses, trains and the Subway, since the Scottish transport authorities have spent years refusing to provide fully integrated ticketing for Joe and Joanna Public.

"The fact that the Scottish government and the UK government have pulled this out the bag - so delegates get the impression we're a normal civilised city - shows what's possible with political will and adequate funding," said Ellie Harrison of the Get Glasgow Moving campaign.

But the tone-deaf Strathclyde Partnership for Transport chose last week to withdraw the Daytripper ticket – a family travelcard – from sale, saying it was "outdated and does not work on rail ticket gates, Subway ticket gates, or bus ticket machines". Never mind that an integrated ticket using all this technology was being rolled out to get COP26 delegates to Glasgow's Scottish Event Campus (SEC) at the same moment.

But not everyone attending the COP26 secure zone got the free card. Glasgow MSP Paul Sweeney heard from a COP26 cleaner who said venue staff – outsourced, of course – were having to fork out for their own travel. "I'm doing agency work cleaning the toilets of world leaders but I still have to pay my own train fares," the worker said. Sweeney told the Eye that while COP26 should have brought people together, "so far it's just highlighted the grotesque differences and inequalities".
